## Proposed Administrative Actions

- Face-to-face meetings, one-on-one with the owners that have the most egregious plantings/fencing
  in the easement that block/hinder access (Chief Kinniry & Commissioner LaVallie have been
  successful in the past)
- If that fails, a written request from the UCFRD Fire Chief & Chairman to the owner
- If that fails, a written complaint from the UCFRD Fire Chief & Chairman to Code Enforcement (<a href="http://www.leegov.com/dcd/CodeEnf">http://www.leegov.com/dcd/CodeEnf</a>, email to <a href="mailto:CodeEnforcement@leegov.com">CodeEnforcement@leegov.com</a>)
- If Code Enforcement fails to enforce the published AND RECORDED easements, then UCFRD Fire Chief & Chairman makes the written complaint to their boss, the Director of Community Development (<a href="http://www.leegov.com/dcd">http://www.leegov.com/dcd</a>), David M. Loveland at <a href="https://www.leegov.com/dcd">DLoveland@leegov.com</a> and 239-533-8509
- If the Director of Community Development fails to enforce, then UCFRD Fire Chief & Chairman makes the written complaint to his boss, Assistant County Manager Douglas Meurer at DMeurer@leegov.com and 239-533-2221
- If Assistant County Manager Douglas Meurer fails to resolve this, then UCFRD Fire Chief & Chairman makes a written complaint to his boss, County Manager Roger Desjarlais at RDesjarlais@leegov.com and 239-533-2221
- And if the County Manager Roger Desjarlais fails to resolve this, then UCFRD Fire Chief & Chairman makes a written complaint to our designated Commissioner District 1, John Manning at <a href="Dist1@leegov.com">Dist1@leegov.com</a> (his Executive Assistant is Rohland, Stacey at <a href="SRohland@leegov.com">SRohland@leegov.com</a>) and 239-533-2224

At some point, the County has to enforce our existing easements ... and they are not currently doing that!
